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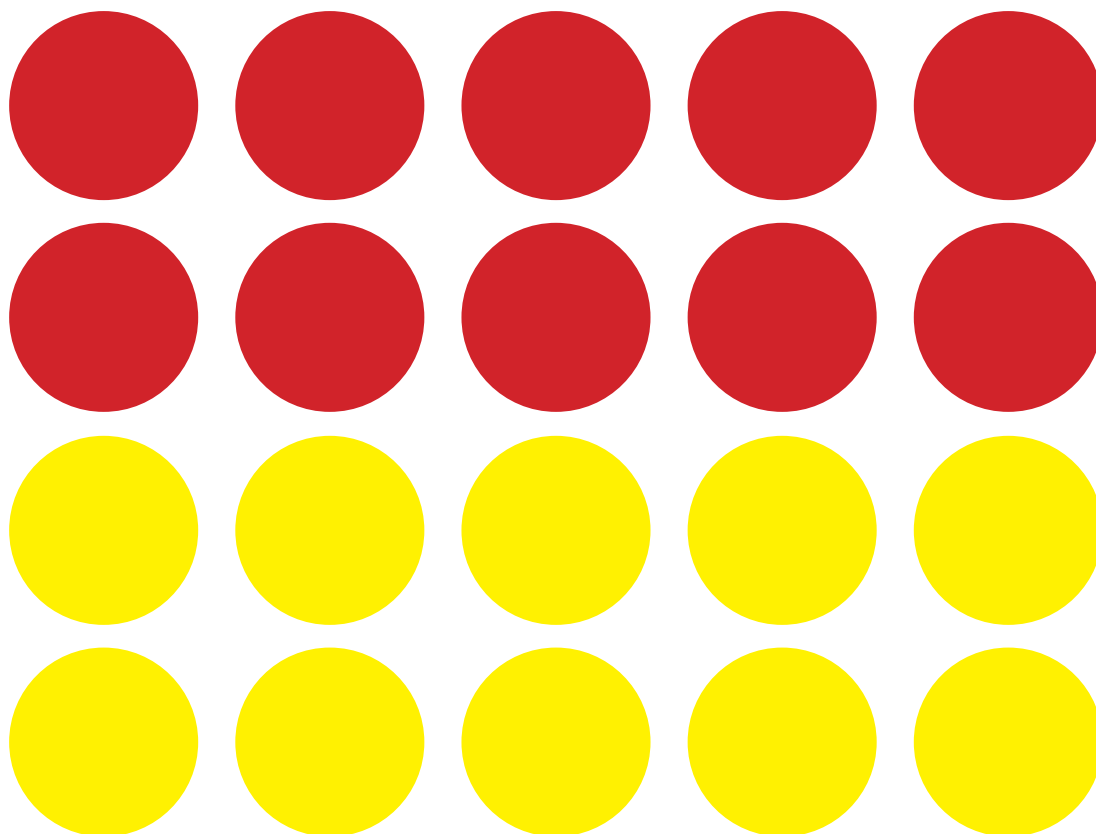
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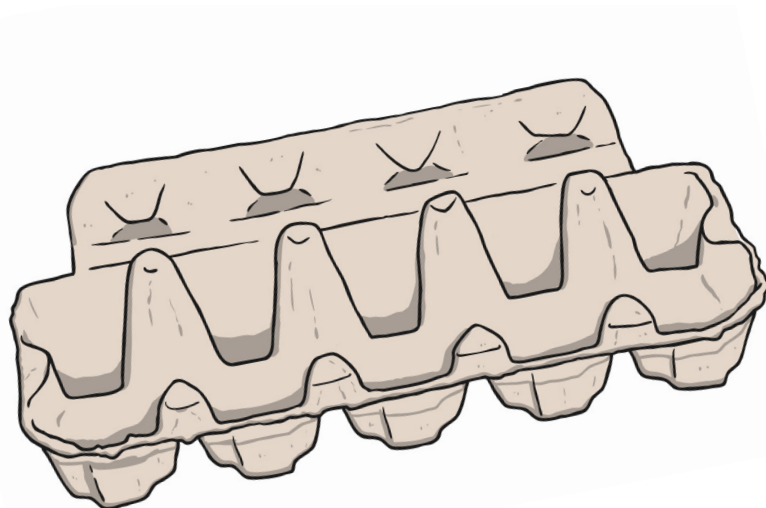
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Egg Box Number Bonds to 10

1. Take an empty dozen egg box and cut off the last pair of egg dimples so you have 10 altogether. You can use a box ready made for 10 eggs if you have one!
2. Next cut out the coloured circles below or have fun finding your own 2 sets of objects. If you look for your own, you need to have 10 of each set, they need to be able to fit in the holes for the eggs and preferably will be different in colour. You could use balls of coloured plasticine, craft pom-poms, money – e.g. 10p pieces and 2p pieces or even pieces of pasta and pieces of cereal.



3. Experiment with your objects filling the egg holders with different combinations. As long as the egg box is full you will always have made 10.
4. Take the big chart on the next page and place it on the table or tack it to the wall to record your findings.
5. When you think you have found all the possibilities, have a look at the sums you have made. Are any of the sums repeated? Are there any that are the same but are just swapped around?
6. Cut out the sums you have made and rearrange them in order according to the number in the object 1 column. Are there any missing? Well done - you have created a list of number bonds to 10!
7. What else could you do with your objects and egg box?
